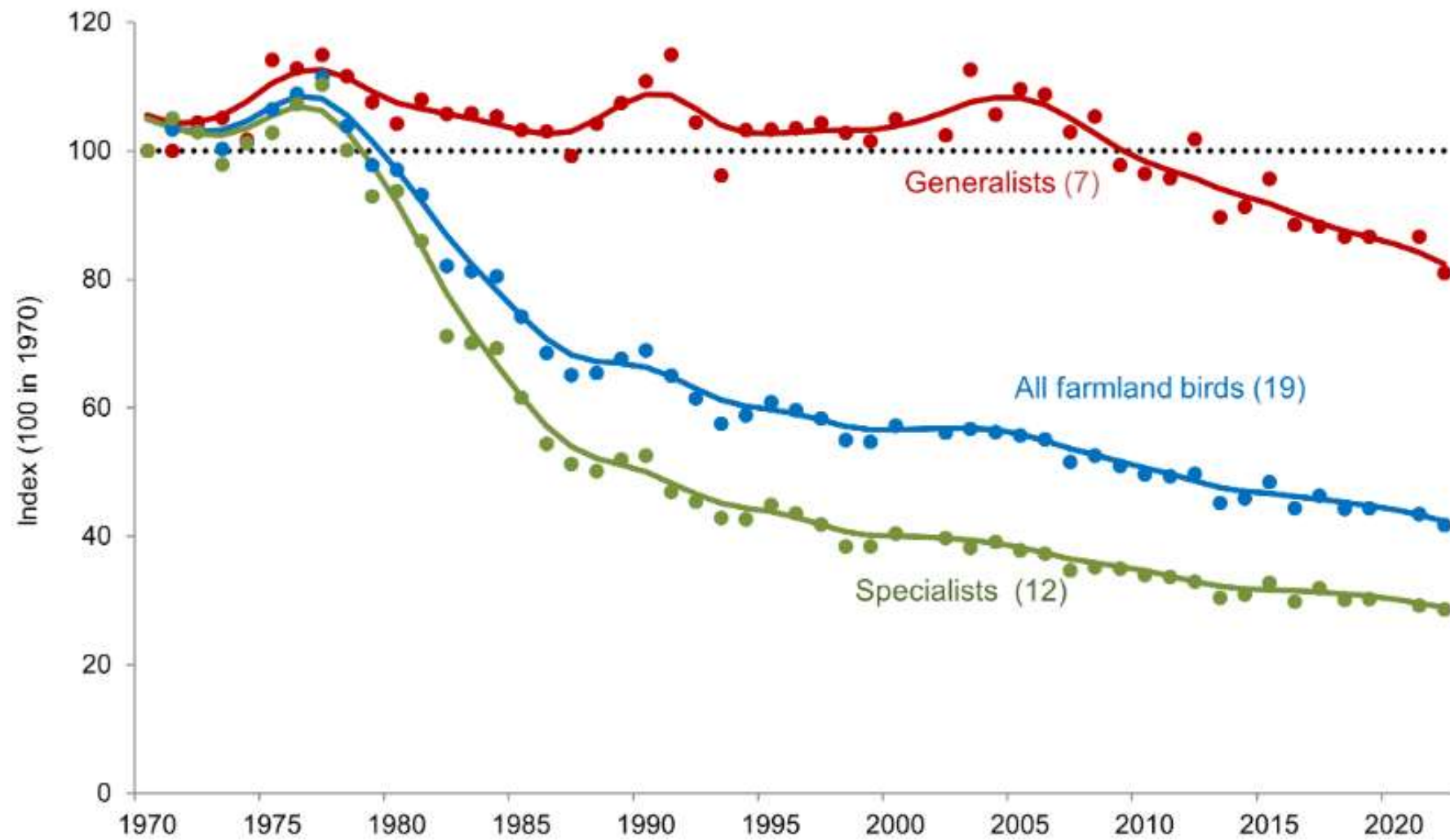


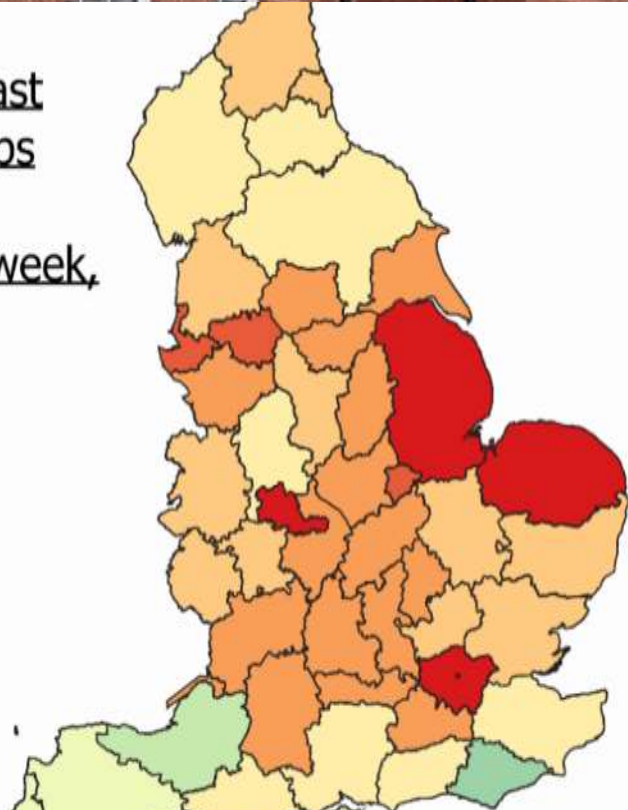
Figure 2. Changes in the abundance of farmland birds between 1970–2022 in the UK. Source: BTO, Defra, JNCC, RSPB.



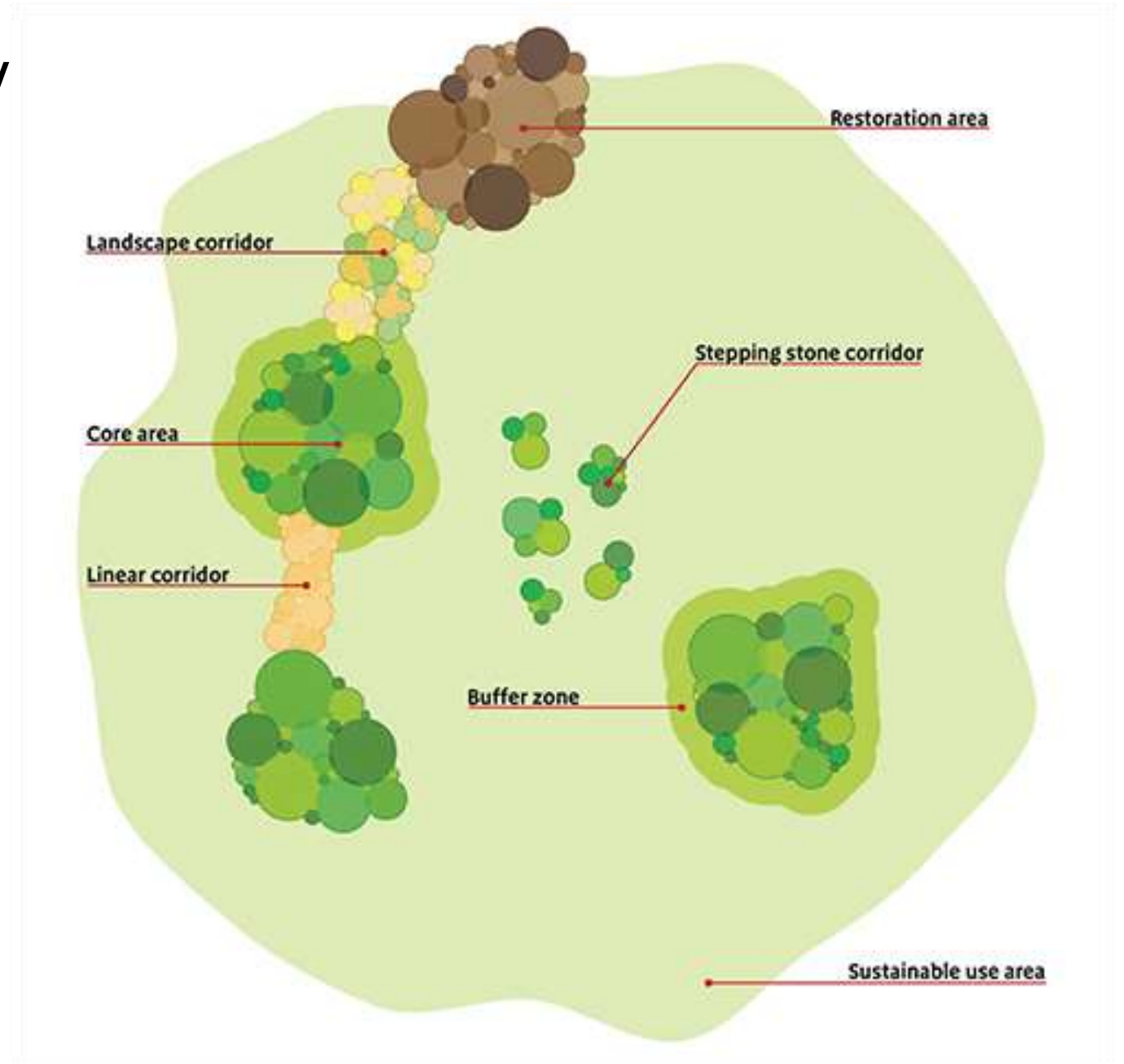




Proportion of adults in the least affluent socio-economic groups (DE) visiting the natural environment at least once a week, by English county.

Goal 3 Nature is playing a central and valued role in helping to address local and global problems.







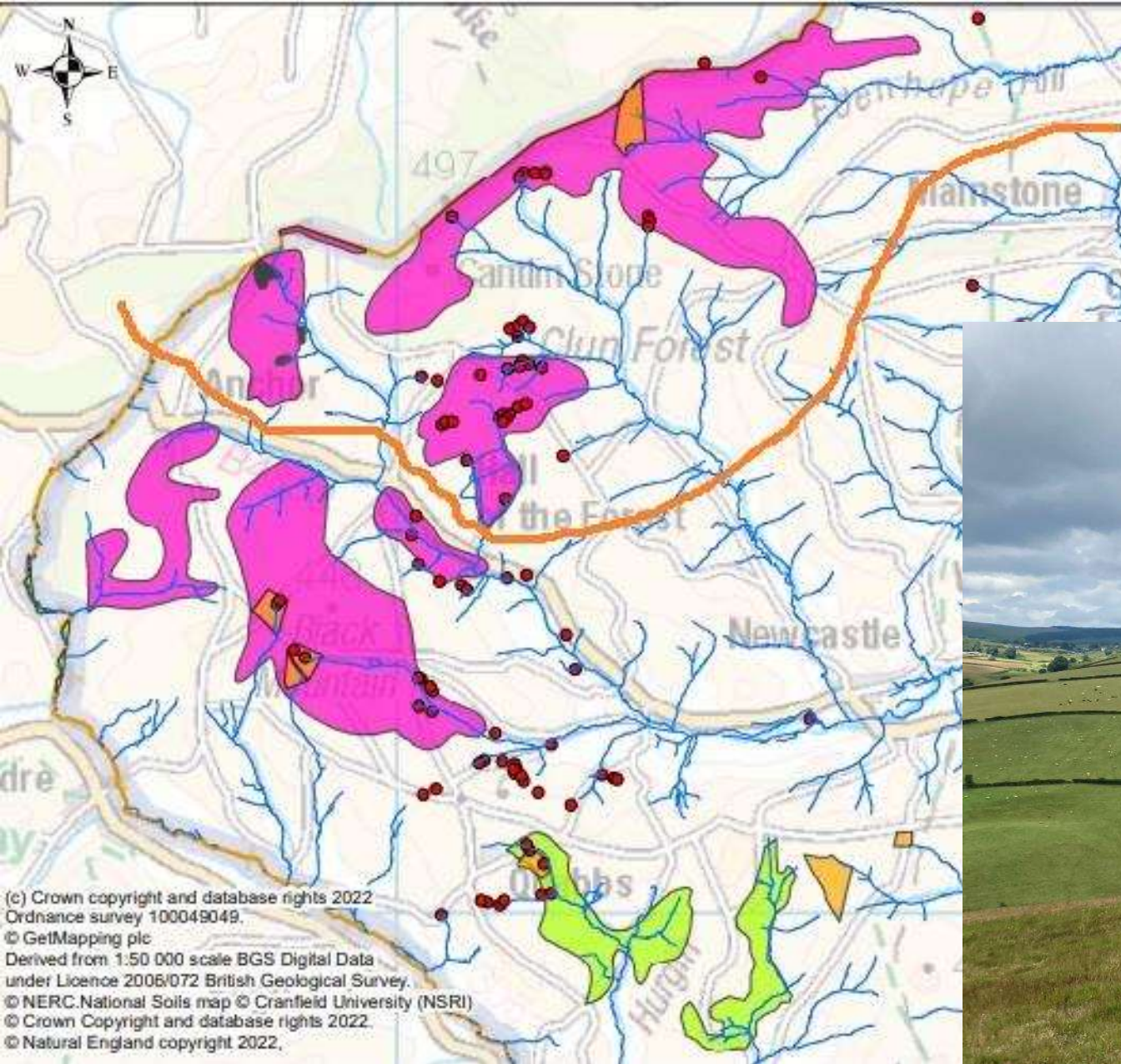

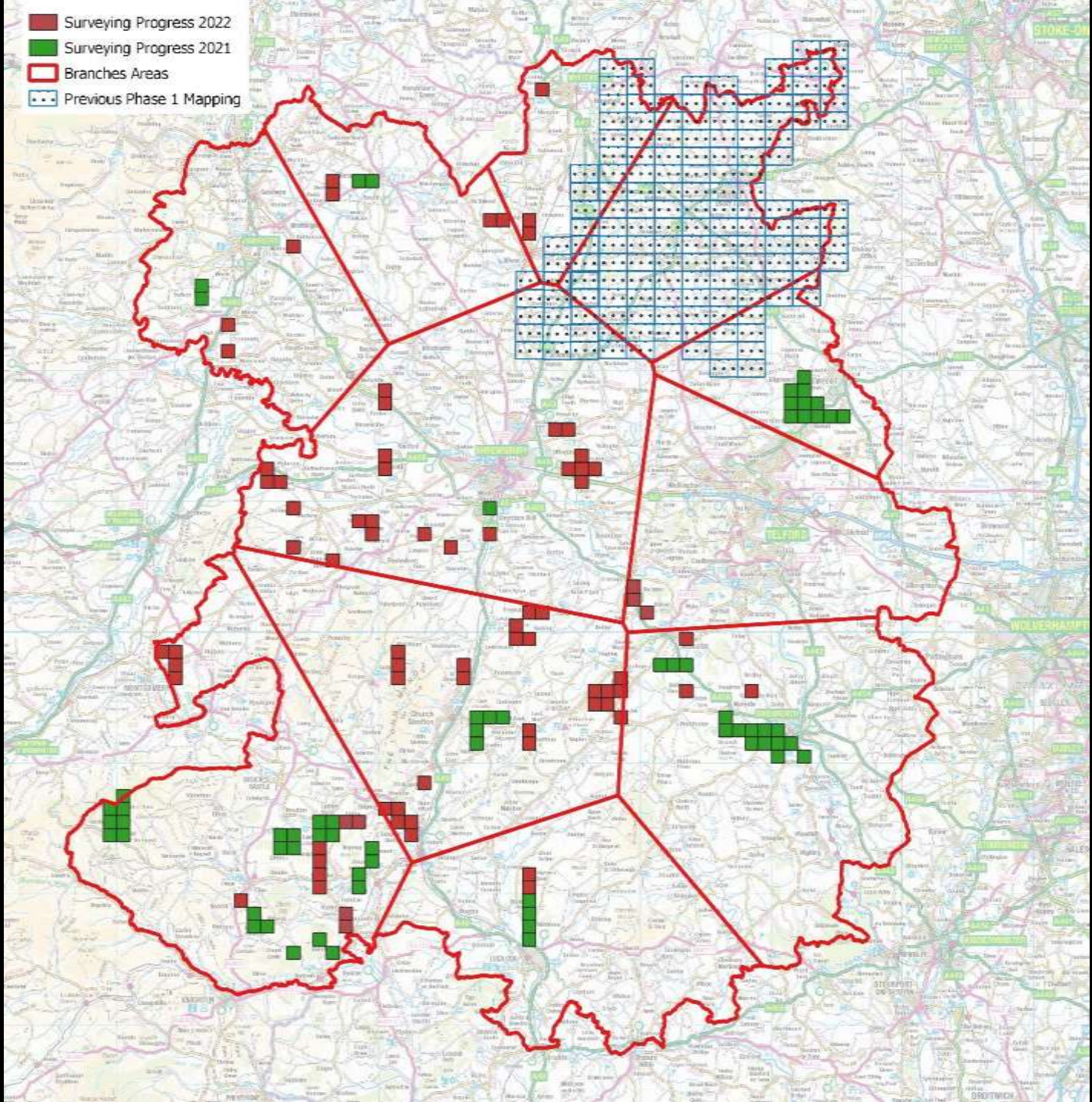
